Violation may result in disqualification

Prior to Commencement of a Match

Always check your Score Ticket to ensure that:

- (a) you are on the correct range and the correct section of the range; and
- (b) it is correctly filled in with the proper sticky label and other required information.

Make certain that you are correctly dressed and equipped according to the Rules, and that you have your ammunition.

Conduct on the Firing Point

Do not delay the start of a match by failing to have your telescope, front sight element, shooting box or scorebook, etc. ready and available at the Firing Point. (Note that, if you are late, your relay will start without you).

Do not talk unless it is necessary. Never shout. You may disturb another competitor. If you wish to attract the attention of a Range Officer, raise your arm, and then quietly explain your requirements.

If you protest against some irregularity and your protest is not upheld, do NOT argue with the Range Officer. If you think you are being treated unjustly, ask that your case be considered by the Chief Range Officer; then state your case clearly and concisely. **BE TOTALLY AWARE OF RULE 26.11. ROs WILL HAVE FORMS TO USE FOR WRITTEN PROTESTS.**

Never try to communicate in any way with anyone who may be standing behind the Firing Point, except if that person is the Range Officer, as such action may lead to "disqualification".

WHEN YOU AND YOUR PARTNER HAVE FINISHED FOLLOW RULE 16.04 TO THE LETTER. YOU AND YOUR SCORER ARE TOTALLY AND SOLELY RESPONSIBLE TO ENSURE THAT THE RIFLE IS CLEARED AND SAFE Await clearance by the Range Officer and take your equipment and move quietly away from the Firing Point. Do not start discussing your score close to competitors who have not finished firing.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee will meet at 2030 hours on the first Friday August 19th at Building 23, Conference Room, for the purpose of selecting a Match Committee and of attending to such other business as may be laid before it in connection with these Matches.

COUNCIL

In accordance with the provisions of the By-Laws of the Association, a meeting of the Council will be held during the period of the competitions. This meeting will be held at 2100 hours on the first Sunday August 21st in Building 23, Conference Room.

SEMI-ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

In accordance with the provision of the By-Laws, a General Meeting of the Association will be held at Connaught Ranges during the period of the competitions. This meeting will be held at 2000 hours, on the first Sunday, August 21st in Building 23, Conference Room.

MATCH COMMITTEE

Meetings of the Match Committee will be held as necessary during the competitions, in the DCRA Headquarters Building (45 Shirley Blvd). Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman at any time necessary and will be indicated by a small blue flag on the flagpole.

GENERAL INFORMATION

LOCATION AND LAYOUT OF CONNAUGHT RANGES

Connaught Ranges is a Canadian Forces establishment located on the western side of Ottawa, near Shirleys Bay on the South bank of the Ottawa River. A map is available at our web site www.dkra.ca. The main access is Malabar Road which runs the length of the Camp from East to West. The area between Malabar Rd. and Shirley Boulevard. contains all of the Camp buildings, accommodation, camping and administrative areas. The area North of Shirley Boulevard contains the following rifle shooting ranges:

"A" Range - (LCol Desmond T. Burke Range), at the extreme West end of the contains 40 targets with firing points spaced every 100 yards back to 600 yards;

"C" Range - (MGen H.F.G. Letson Range), in the centre of the Camp, is the largest and longest Range. It contains 76 targets with firing points spaced every 100 metres back to 900 metres;

"D" Range - (Capt T.W. MacDowell, V.C. Range), is at the East end of "C" Range, and contains 30 targets with firing points spaced every 100 metres back to 300 metres;

NOTICE BOARDS

The official Competition Notice Board is located on the veranda of the DCRA Competition Office, 45 Shirley Blvd. It will contain bulletins required to amend the Rules or conditions of competitions, notices of shoot offs, prize presentation ceremonies, entertainment, and details of incoming mail, messages and meetings.

Mail slots are also provided on the porch for Provincial and International Team Captains and DCRA competition staff.

Results are posted for 24 hours for review and challenge before they are re-posted as final. Any request for corrections must be processed in the first 24 hours.

EQUIPMENT INSPECTION

Canadian Championships Monitoring of rule compliance for the Canadian Championships will consist of two components: competitor safety verification and random spot checking for compliance during the competition. All competitors are required to complete and sign a certification of safety that is provided with the registration package and present it to the DCRA office during registration at the DCRA counter. No score cards will be issued without this.

A self test facility for trigger and rifle weight confirmation will be provided and the location advised on the bulletin board. The range staff will conduct random trigger and rifle weight tests on the range. The Secretary-Treasurer will maintain an on-call weight test capability throughout the competition. Compliance with other rules will be monitored by DCRA assigned scrutineers and range staff.

Ammunition Inspection The DCRA will establish a means of checking and testing any competitor's ammunition as deemed necessary. Competitors may be asked to provide three rounds for inspection. A detailed instruction, including certification form and schedule will be provide to each competitor for completion and presentation at registration.

SAFETY

The Chief Range Officer/ Range Safety Officer is appointed by authority of the President of the DCRA. All competitors are reminded that they MUST read the official rules concerning safety on and off the firing point and obey all DCRA rules and CRPTC Range Orders. An aide-memoire card will be provided to each competitor reminding them of their responsibilities. Assistant Range Officers are to ensure that each competitor's range card is signed by the shooter and scorer certifying that they have cleared their firearms of any round before they are permitted to leave the firing point.

Individuals requiring a place to hand load ammunition are to contact the DCRA office in advance and advise it of their team's requirement. A location, schedule and instructions will be issued.

RIFLE AND AMMUNITION SECURITY

Rifles and ammunition are to be secured in accordance with the requirements of the Canadian Firearms Act. Information on the Act can be obtained at the DCRA headquarters and from the DCRA web site. For those who do not have secure storage facilities available, storage in the CRPTC ammunition and firearms lockup will be arranged. Under no circumstances is ammunition or a firearm to be left unattended in an insecure state. Ammunition may not be stored in government quarters.

RANGE COORDINATION

In the case of inclement weather, a decision to cancel or postpone a match or matches will be made by the Programme Chairman with the advice of the CRO. In the case of an announced postponement, competitors are to keep themselves available on camp until the published time of the last match of the day. Updates will be provided on the official DCRA notice board.

PRIZE PRESENTATIONS

Black Powder Individual awards will be presented at the NCRRA Clubhouse Saturday 20 August, starting at approximately 1700 hours. An award ceremony for team trophies and medals and luncheon for the Black Powder matches will be held in the DCRA Marquee, or NCRRA club house, on Saturday 21 August at 1300 hours.

Canadian Championships TR and F Class. The annual Prize Ceremony will be conducted on Saturday August 27th commencing at 1745 hours in the DCRA Marquee. A reception with light food and a cash bar follows the ceremony.

SOCIAL EVENTS

Meet and Greet Reception and Dinner The annual Meet and Greet Dinner for competitors and their guests will be held Saturday August 20th. Reception and pre-dinner drinks (cash bar) at 1830 hours, to be followed by a carved hip of beef buffet dinner at 1930 hours. Tickets are to be ordered on the entry form; a limited number of tickets may be available at the DCRA counter but availability is not guaranteed.

Annual Dinner The annual Macdonald Stewart Foundation Dinner will be conducted at

the Hotel Fairmont Chateau Laurier on Friday August 26th. The timings are Cocktails at 1930 hours and dinner at 2030 hours. Invitations will be issued on behalf of Mrs. Stewart by the Office Manager.

GROUP PHOTOGRAPH

Group photographs of F class finalists and Governor General finalists will be taken by the Secretary-Treasurer on the DCRA porch prior to the start of competition.

LIVING ACCOMMODATION

The DCRA will allocate bed spaces to competitors based on entry form requests. Competitors arriving during working hours will report to DCRA on arrival to obtain their accommodation allocation, lock and combination number from the office staff. After 2300 hours (11PM), individuals are to secure commercial accommodation for the night and report to DCRA in the morning. Only DCRA supplied combination locks will be used unless special arrangements are made with the office staff.

Competitors will pay DCRA for their accommodation. For those staying in quarters, three meals per day are included in the price of \$40.00 / day – no exceptions. For those in camper trailers or private tents, the cost per night is \$8.00 or \$40 as above if meals are required.

Competitors may purchase a lunch at the kitchen on a walk-up basis for \$10.

Washers and dryers are installed in the trailer accommodation and in the camping area ablution buildings. Please do not abuse them. There are no facilities in the Camp for shopping or dry cleaning; however, these services are available in Kanata North and Bell's Corners (East from the Camp entrance 1 mile along Carling Avenue, and then South 2 miles on Moodie Drive).

Good hotel and motel accommodation is available at commercial rates within a few miles of the Ranges. Most of these are located in Bell's Corners or in Kanata. The Kanata Comfort Inn has offered a reduced rate for DCRA guests and they may be contacted through the DCRA web site or 1-800-4-CHOICE. Advise them that you are a DCRA guest.

CAMPING/ HOTELS

The usual camping ground has been permanently closed. No RVs, caravans or 5th Wheels

will be permitted to park at Connaught, following instructions by the Camp Commander. A limited number of light camper-trailers and private tents may be parked in an area to be designated by the Connaught authorities. Competitors allocated a camper-trailer or tent site will sign an agreement on site use for signature that describes conditions of occupancy, including such policies as the prohibition of generator use and waste disposal. The site is not fully developed and limited power of less than 15 amps is provided to each site. The use of generators is prohibited. The electrical system at the camping spots is not designed for heavy use. Users are warned that trouble calls will not be placed after normal working hours if the breaker goes. They will only be set by a Public Works person the following working day. There are no water, garbage removal or site sanitation facilities. A sticker will be issued by the DCRA staff and must be displayed on the camper-trailer or tent unit. Military tents may be made available for those requesting such accommodation, or for overflow.

The local civilian campsite is the Ottawa-Nepean Municipal Campsite at (613) 828-6632.

AMMUNITION

DCRA will coordinate identified needs with Range Control for the provision of any temporary ammunition storage and rifle lock-up.

FOOD SERVICE

As stated above, all competitors living in quarters on camp will pay a flat fee of \$40.00 for shared accommodation and three meals a day. The only casual cash sales for meals for those not in quarters will be a lunch for \$10.

There are also several good commercial restaurants in the general area. Chinese and Italian food, fried chicken, and ice cream parlours are available some 3 to 4 miles east of the Camp entrance along Carling Avenue; while steak houses and fast food outlets are in Bell's Corners (East 1 mile on Carling Avenue to Moodie Drive, and then South 2 miles). Two British style Pubs are located in Carp, approximately 15 minutes to the west. Soft drinks are available in Camp from several coin-operated machines and a canteen and a bar operates each evening in the CRPTC staff Mess. A list of establishments that support DCRA by advertising in our publications will be posted and we encourage you to patronize them and let them know that you are from DCRA.

BAR SERVICE

Alcoholic beverages may only be consumed in approved areas. The CRPTC canteen will provide a daily evening service during the competition as long as there is a sufficient customer load.

MEDICAL

In the case of medical emergency, firing will cease and first aid will be administered. 911 is to be called for Para-med or ambulance service. The problem is to be described and the site described as as "Connaught Range." The Range Control Officer and the DCRA Secretary Treasurer are to be notified. Range Control will meet the ambulance vehicle at the camp entrance gate and guide it to the accident site. Military competitors

may be tended to by military medical staff on site at CRPTC.

HOUSEKEEPING AND CLEANLINESS

In the interests of sanitation, appearance and economy, all users are requested to keep Connaught Ranges as clean and tidy as possible. Pick up after yourself, and place all garbage in the receptacles provided. **On departing allocated accommodation, all garbage is to be removed from the room and the linen folded and left on the edge of the bed and the floor swept.**

FIRE HAZARDS

Connaught Ranges in high summer season can present several extremely severe fire hazards. Know the location of your nearest fire extinguisher. Study the various escape routes that may have to be used in the event of fire.

Cooking, heating or other uses of open flames, including mosquito coils, are **NOT** permitted in classrooms, tents, marquees, trailers or cubicles. The use of generators or gasoline storage at the RV site is not permitted outside of designated and signed storage areas, equipped with fire fighting equipment. Ensure that all smokers' materials are thoroughly extinguished after use.

To guard against spontaneous combustion, ensure that cleaning patches and oily rags are placed in a closed metal container.

Due to usual dryness of the grassed tented areas, it is important that you park your vehicle only in the designated locations and that assigned spacing is adhered to.

TELEPHONES

Several pay phones are located throughout the Camp. The DCRA office phones are not available for routine personal calls. Hook-ups for internet connections are not available.

TRAFFIC REGULATION AND PARKING

The speed limits on Camp are clearly posted and enforced regularly. Please stay within these limits, in view of the many pedestrians, narrow roads, marching groups and the dust and noise problems. Parking is permitted only in designated, signed areas; **parking on any grassed area is strictly prohibited.** There is no parking allowed behind the firing points on the grass without a down range pass that may be obtained from DCRA with proof of medical need. Golf carts are allowed on the range and are available for rental, with advance notice of at least 30 days. Individuals living off camp are to park their vehicles on the parade square. Individuals living on camp are to park in the designated lot adjacent to the trailer quarters. Unless necessary, to meet match timings, competitors are asked not to move their vehicle from these designated parking areas when firing on C or D range.

The camp is regularly patrolled by the Military Police, who are empowered to issue tickets for traffic or parking infractions. Military Police make periodic spot checks of vehicles leaving camp.

There are no charges for camp passes or parking, but the right is reserved to refuse entry. DND regulations require all vehicles to be insured before their entry is permitted to the camp. The DCRA will provide a windshield information card to be displayed in the windshield all vehicles on camp.

Pedestrians, when walking along the roadways, are requested to walk on the left side of the road facing oncoming traffic.

A limited number will be provided by DCRA upon application.

SILENT HOURS POLICY

It is requested that everyone in Camp adopt a "silent hours" policy between 2300 hours and 0600 hours on nights preceding competitions.

PETS

Pets are not permitted on Connaught Range and Primary Training Centre property.

PRESENTATION OF PRIZES

The formal presentation of the principal Trophies and Medals of the Canadian Championships will take place in the Marquee on Second Saturday August 27th 2011 at 1745 hrs.

Winners of both individual and team events are earnestly requested to attend. All trophies and all first place Gold Medallions with event bars, for both Target Rifle (TR) and F Classes, will be presented at the Prize Presentation.

Notes:

1. The presentation list will be posted on the bulletin board, and winners must notify the Secretary's Office of their intention to attend the presentation of prizes by no later than 1300 hours on the final Saturday. Otherwise, the prize may not be called.
2. Persons intending to have their prizes presented, must be dressed in a manner suitable for the occasion. Shooting gear is not acceptable.

TARGET RIFLE and F CLASS MATCHES

Two divisions of F-Class will be offered, F/Open and F/Farquharson. Please note that in 2011, F/Farquharson incorporates the least-restrictive constraints of "ICFRA F-TR" and previous DCRA F/F. In other words, any bullet weight may be used, and any type of front support may be used.

As in 2009 and 2010, all F-Class competitors will fire on new F-Class targets utilizing "5-V" scoring, and will therefore always shoot separately from TR competitors. A special "F-Class Patch" will be applied over a standard TR V-bull ring, to yield an F-Class 5-ring and V-ring.

TR competitors may use a telescopic sight of no greater than 4-power in all matches. However, those using such scopes will be ineligible to win the Grand Aggregate, the Canadian Target Rifle Championship and the Governor General's Prize.

F-Class competitors may ask to shoot "For Honours Only". In this case they will be squadded amongst the TR shooters, and fire on the TR targets and be scored 5-V in the TR manner. Their scores will be listed separately from TR shooters and other F-Class shooters.

Single Match Entries: Space permitting, individuals may enter single matches (NO aggregates) on payment of an appropriate fee. Details on the number of spaces available, cost and times when entries can be made will be posted on the Notice Board.

Warmup Matches

The Canadian .223/5.56 Championship (#606)

Since sportsmanship, character and shooting performance shall be the basis for this award, it is most important that the PRAs and NDHQRA/NCRRA ensure that nominees will attend the National Matches in the year of their nomination and that their competence as shooters affords them a fair chance of top performance at the National Matches and, hence, a fair chance to win the award.

The qualifying conditions for nomination of a candidate for the 'Des Burke Award - Target Rifle' shall be determined by the PRAs and NDHQRA/NCRRA, and need not be the same for each such association. The common denominator for all candidates will be shooting performance at the National Matches.

Thanks to his outstanding leadership and diplomacy the DCRA came through this contentious period a united and stronger Association. He led the Association's Building Committee in the construction of our new headquarters building and spearheaded the fundraising campaign, which succeeded in raising in excess of \$220,000 over a two year period.

The **Canada Club Cup** was donated to the Canadian Wimbledon Team Commandant by the Canada Club of London in 1886 and was presented to Trooper Beatty, the high aggregate team member that year. A review of the annals reveals that the provision of a trophy by the Canada Club of London was for some time an annual occurrence and it was awarded to Canadian Team members for varying accomplishments.

In 2005 it was brought to the attention of the DCRA that the 1886 trophy was available on auction on eBay. Through the generosity of donations from DCRA members, the trophy was bid for and purchased.

Team Competitions - Precedence

In team competitions scheduled for the same time, the order of precedence for team personnel selection will be in accordance with Rule 6.07(3).

Team Competitions – Prizes

In certain team competitions, the number of prizes is determined by the number of teams entered. These numbers are shown in the conditions for each match. No prizes will be awarded if only one team, or if less than the

specified minimum number of teams, enters. Under these circumstances, the full entry fee will be refunded for concurrent team matches. For shoulder-to-shoulder matches, teams may opt either to withdraw from the match, with full refund of the entry fee, or to fire the match's course of fire, with a 50% refund of the entry fee.

International (Overseas) Teams and Visitors from outside Canada

Provided the provisions of DCRA Rules have been met, visiting teams do not have to declare an "official squad" in advance.

Classification of competitors from outside Canada will be in accordance with DCRA Rules (Chapter 5.04).

Countries from outside Canada wishing to be considered as a group for team competition must submit their request, in writing, to the Executive Committee via the Match Director preferably well before arrival at Connaught and in any case not later than 48 hours before the deadline for entries to any competition in which they might wish to participate and not later than 1800 hours First Friday.

Official Provincial Teams

Official Provincial Teams may consist of a maximum of a Captain and thirty (30) members. Teams may not have more than 20 members who are MASTERS or EXPERTS.

Qualification for a Provincial Team is by permanent residence or birth. In the case of a shooter being 'claimed' by two Provinces, that of permanent residence will take precedence. For this purpose, the "Lakehead" area will be included in Manitoba.

The list of names and competitor numbers of the members of the official team must be handed in to the DCRA Office in duplicate, not later than 1200 hours (noon) First Sunday.

Provincial Association teams wishing to be considered as a group for team competition must submit their request, in writing, to the Executive Committee via the Match Director preferably well before arrival at Connaught and in any case not later than 48 hours before the deadline for entries to any competition in which they might wish to participate and no later than 1800 hours First Friday.

Procedure for Team Captains

1. Match entries must be made by the time stated on the previous pages. This is to ensure that adequate targets and staff are available.
2. For shoulder-to-shoulder team matches, the names and competitor numbers of team members, including all team officers, coaches, and reserves as well as shooters, must be given in writing on the proper form, obtained from the DCRA Office at time of entry, to the Range Officer conducting the match, at the time of rifle testing and/or target allocation on the range.
3. For concurrent aggregates, unless otherwise stated in the conditions for the competition, the names and competitor numbers must be submitted to the DCRA Office on the proper form before the commencement of the first range of the aggregate.

INTERNATIONAL TEAM MATCHES

The International Palma Match

This historic long range match was officially revived in 1967 as part of the DCRA's celebrations of Canada's Centennial. The governing body was a joint committee of the National Rifle Association of the United States of America and the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association. It was agreed that other countries could host the match with the approval of the governing body.

The Palma Match is firmly established as part of the Long Range World Shooting Championship and is now managed by the International Confederation of Fullbore Rifle Associations, which has assumed the responsibilities of the former International Palma Council

The next World Long Range Championships and Palma Match will be held at Brisbane, Australia, in 2011.

The America Match (#750)

The America Match (TR and F Class) will be next fired in the USA in 2012 (location TBA). It will next be fired in Canada at Connaught Ranges, Ottawa, 24 August 2014.

RULES AND CONDITIONS OF THE AMERICA MATCH

CONDITIONS

The America Match in which National Teams compete for the America Trophy may only be conducted when authorized by the National Rifle Association (NRA) of the United States of America and when an official team endorsed by the NRA Highpower Committee of the NRA Competitions Division is present and competing.

FREQUENCY

The Match will normally be held every second year, with the venue alternating between Canada and the United States of America. The Match will not be held in a year in which the International Palma Match is being held. Other countries may, on application to and approval by the National Rifle Association of the United States of America, be invited to conduct the match. The schedule will be determined by the National Rifle Association of the United States of America, with the date and venue of the match being announced to all potential competing nations not less than eighteen (18) months prior to the match. Teams must declare their

intention to participate not less than twelve (12) months prior to the Match.

ENTRY FEE

The Host Country may charge an entry fee to defray the costs of conducting the Match. The fee shall be announced to all teams that have declared an intention to participate not less than six (6) months prior to the Match.

TEAM COMPOSITION

Teams shall consist of a (1) Captain, a (1) Vice-Captain, one (1) main Coach, two (2) sub-Coaches, eight (8) firers and two (2) reserves, a total of fifteen (15) team members. Only team members may take part in firing point activities. If one of the firers falls ill and is unable to continue, another member of the team may take his/her place.

DISTANCES

300, 600, 900 and 1000 yards, or 300, 600, 800 and 900 metres, as appropriate to the venue.

NUMBER OF SHOTS

Each firing member of the team shall fire two (2) sighting shots (convertible) and fifteen (15) shots on score at each distance.

SIGHTING SHOTS

Two sighting shots shall be fired at each distance, of which the second or both may be converted. If shooting is interrupted for any team or teams by any external cause for more than three (3) minutes, the firer or firers so interrupted shall, on resuming, be allowed one sighting shot which is not-convertible. In the event of a rifle being changed, a sighting shot is not permitted.

TIME LIMITS

1 hour 20 minutes 300 yds/300m and 600yds/600m

1 hour 45 minutes 900yds/800m and 1000yds/900m

If firing is interrupted by any external cause for more than three (3) minutes, Team Captains may request an extension of time. The Chief Range Officer will ensure that any extension is properly allowed.

CONDUCT OF THE MATCH

The Council of the National Rifle Association hosting the Match shall appoint a Match Executive Officer and a Chief Range Officer who shall be responsible for the overall arrangements for and conduct of the Match in accordance with the Rules.

MEETING

Not less than the day prior to the Match, the Match Executive Officer shall

chair a meeting of all Team Captains, Vice-Captains and the Chief Range Officer to resolve any issues or questions pertaining to the conduct of the Match.

DISPUTES

Disputes (if any) shall be heard by a Match Committee of three (3) persons, consisting of the Match Executive Officer, Chief Range Officer and one other person from a/the non-host country appointed by those present at the pre-match meeting.

RIFLES

Rifles must conform to the currently approved Rules for the International Palma Match, except that the Host Country may specify the maximum rifle weight and minimum trigger weight. Rifles must be chambered for standard 308 Winchester. A rifle may be changed at any time for any reason (see sighting shots above). Team members may use the same rifle.

RIFLE CHECKING

All rifles to be used by teams in the Match shall be checked by the Match Executive Officer and Chief Range Officer for conformation with the Rules prior to the commencement of firing the first range. Rifles which have been checked and which conform to the rules shall have a distinguishing sticker attached. Random checks of rifles may be carried out by the Match Executive Officer or the Chief Range Officer at any time during the course of the Match.

AMMUNITION

308 Winchester ammunition is to be provided by each team or team member. The maximum bullet weight shall be 156 grains. The Host Country is not required to provide ammunition. Random checks of ammunition may be carried out by the Match Executive Officer or the Chief Range Officer at any time during the course of the Match.

SHOOTING POSITION

Prone, as defined the Rules of the Host Country.

TARGETS

Two targets shall be available to each team and shall conform to those of the Host Country for each distance shot. Draws for targets will be held by the Chief Range Officer prior to the 300y/m and 900y/800m distances. The Chief Range Officer may require teams to shift targets between ranges.

BUTTS OBSERVER

Each team may, at its discretion, send one observer to the butts. Observers must be in the butts before the draws for targets are held.

SCORE CARDS

Score cards shall be provided by the Host Country. Copies of the scores cards for all teams in the Match shall be forwarded to the National Rifle Association of the United States of America no later than two months after the firing of the Match. The National Rifle Association of the United States of America shall maintain records of all scores made and of all team members, including coaches and reserves, for each America Match.

SCORING

Each team shall provide two (2) scorers, who will score for another team as directed by the Chief Range Officer. Team members, including reserves, or other volunteers may act as scorers.

TIES

Team scores are tied when the points and V(X)-bulls are equal. Ties shall be resolved by the highest team scores at the longest range fired.

TROPHIES AND AWARDS

The "America Match" Trophy and fifteen (15) special DCRA medals will be presented to the winning team. The Trophy was purchased from a special fund established by Precision Shooting Magazine. The Trophy may, at the sole discretion of the NRA, be held by the Association of the winning team, or remain in the custody of the NRA. If the former, the Association will accept the responsibility for safe storage of the trophy, for having it properly engraved and for ensuring that it is transported to the next venue at the appropriate time.

GENERAL

- (1) Any matter not provided for in these Rules and Conditions shall be decided on at the Meeting of the Match Executive Officer, Chief Range Officer, Team Captains and Vice-Captains prior to the Match.
- (2) All matters arising during the Match shall be resolved by the Match Committee.
- (3) As far as is practicable, no other firing will take place on the same rifle range on the day that the America Match is held.
- (4) Unless otherwise specified, the Rules of the International Palma Match and of the Host Country shall be those governing the America Match.

VARIATIONS TO RULES/CONDITIONS

Variations to these Rules and Conditions may only be made by the National Rifle Association of the United States and shall be circulated to all participating teams not less than twelve months prior to the next firing of the Match.

The America Match Alongside F Class (#751)

Up to 15 team members, same team composition as America Match, from a single country or DCRA approved group of countries. Only one team from a country or group may enter. At least four of the firers must fire F/TR rifles, the rest may fire F/Open rifle.

DCRA F Class Rules will apply. DCRA F-Class targets will be used, and will be scored 5-V.

All other conditions and timings will be as those for the America Match.

Prizes: The US F Class Challenge Trophy and 15 special DCRA Medals will be awarded to the winning team.

The Canada Match (#656)

(Second Saturday)

Open to TR teams of a Captain, Adjutant, Main Coach, eight shooting members, two Sub-Coaches and two spares.

One team from Canada and one team from each Official Visiting International Team, or DCRA approved group of such Teams. Subject to availability of space and target markers, additional teams may enter the match to shoot alongside for honours only, for 50% of the regular entry fee.

Distances: 300y, 500y and 600y

Rounds: 10 at each distance

Targets: 2 for each team at each distance.

Time Limit: 60 minutes at each distance.

The Captain of the Canadian team shall be appointed by the Council of the DCRA.

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by team members (including spares).

Each team must supply two register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The Canada Cup.** A Challenge Trophy presented by the Canadian National Railways.

Fifteen DCRA Canada Match Badges will be awarded to the winning team. If at least four teams have signified their intention to compete by 15th May 2011, and do actually compete in the match, the DCRA will present 15 silver medals to the second place team; if six or more teams so indicate and compete, the DCRA will award 15 bronze medals to the third place team.

The Commonwealth Match (#657)
(Second Friday)

Open to TR teams of a Captain, Adjutant, Main Coach, twelve shooting members, three Sub-Coaches and three spares.

One team from Canada and one team from each Official Visiting International Team, or DCRA-approved group of such Teams. Subject to availability of space and target markers, additional teams may enter the match to shoot alongside for honours only, for 50% of the regular entry fee.

Distances: 800m and 900m.

Number of Shots: 10 at each distance

Targets 2 for each team at each distance.

Time Limit: 64 minutes at each distance.

The Captain of the Canadian team shall be appointed by the Council of the DCRA.

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by team members (including spares). Each team must supply three register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The Empire Trophy**, presented by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

Twenty one DCRA Commonwealth Match Badges will be awarded to the winning team. If at least four teams have signified their intention to compete by 15th May 2011, and do actually compete in the match, the DCRA will present 21 silver medals to the second place team; if six or more teams so indicate and compete, the DCRA will award 21 bronze medals to the third place team.

F Class Thursday Team Practice (#730)

(Second Thursday PM)

Open to teams of 4 F/Open and 4 F/Farquharson shooters, plus Captain, Adjutant, Coach, 2 sub-Coaches and two spares.

Conditions as for the **Outlander**.

Prizes: None. Entry fees charged will be 50% of Outlander, as per an “alongside” match.

F Class Friday Team Practice (#731)

(Second Friday PM)

Open to teams of 4 F/Open and 4 F/Farquharson shooters, plus Captain, Adjutant, Coach, 2 sub-Coaches and two spares.

Conditions as for the **Commonwealth**.

Prizes: None. Entry fees charged will be 50% of the Commonwealth Match, as per an “alongside” match.

F Class Saturday Team Practice (#732)

(Second Saturday AM)

Open to teams of 4 F/Open and 4 F/Farquharson shooters, plus Captain, Adjutant, Coach, 2 sub-Coaches and two spares.

Distances: 700m, 800m, 900m

Rounds: 10 at each distance

Targets: 2 for each team at each distance

Time Limit: 35 minutes at each distance

Prizes: None. Entry fees charged will be 50% of the Canada Match, as per an “alongside” match.

The Lum Trophy (#673)

(Second Friday)

Open to teams of F Class shooters from a single country. Any number of

teams from a country may enter for the “Black and Tan” Challenge.

Conditions as for the **Algonquin**.

Prizes: The “**Lum**” Trophy presented in 1998 by Mr. W.J. Wylde of Greenup, Illinois, and **five Silver Medals** will be awarded to the winning team.

The Outlander (#658)

(Second Thursday)

Open to visiting non-Canadian teams, or DCRA approved groups of such teams. Teams to consist of a Captain, Adjutant, Coach, eight shooting members, two Sub-Coaches and two spares. Any number of teams from a country or group may enter subject to range space being available.

Distance: 600y and 900m

Rounds: 15 at each distance

Targets: 2 for each team at each distance

Time Limit: 85 minutes at 600y, 91 minutes at 900m

Prizes: 1st place **The Bund der Militär- und Polizeischützen e.V. Trophy**, presented in 1995 by the BdMP for international competition at the DCRA Annual Matches and **12 Medals**

Each team must supply two register keepers to the Range Officer.

The Under 25 International Long Range Team Match (#659)

(Second Friday)

Team eligibility and composition as for the Under 25 International Short Range Team Match (see below). Each team must supply two register keepers to the Range Officer.

Conditions as for the Commonwealth Match, except for:

Targets: 2 for each team at each distance

Prizes: 12 DCRA Badges will be awarded to the winning team. If four or more teams enter, the DCRA will award 12 silver medals to the second place team.

The Under 25 International Short Range Team Match (#660)
(Second Saturday)

Open to teams of Captain, Coach, eight shooting members and two spares.

All members of the team must be under 25 on the 1st July of the year the match is fired.

One team from Canada and one team from any other country or DCRA approved group of countries (Team members must be resident in their Team's country).

The Captain of the Canadian Team shall be appointed by the Council of the DCRA.

All other conditions as for the Canada Match.

Coaching and Spotting are allowed only by team members (including spares). Each team must supply two register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The Spencer Challenge Trophy.** The Charlie Spencer Trophy was dedicated by his family in 1983 in recognition of the help and encouragement Charlie provided to new shooters.

12 DCRA Badges will be awarded to the winning team. If four or more teams enter, the DCRA will award 12 silver medals to the second place team.

Members of the Canadian Teams in the Under-25 Short Range and Long Range Matches will receive a commemorative badge awarded by the DCRA.

Rifle Teams

Canadian Rifle Team to Bisley

The arrangements for the Annual Canadian Rifle Team to Bisley in England are made by the Executive Committee acting on behalf of the Council.

The team will normally consist of a Commandant, an Adjutant, two coaches and eighteen or more TR and F Class shooting members. The team's size may, however, be altered in any year by the Executive Committee.

The Commandant and three potential Adjutants will be nominated and selected by Council. The Commandant will choose his/her Adjutant from the three names selected by Council. The coaches will be selected by the Commandant under arrangements approved by the Executive Committee.

The shooting members of the team will be selected as follows:

1. **Primary Selection Process for TR shooters:** Invitations to join the Team will be issued immediately after the CFRC to the 35 shooters in the Canadian Target Rifle Championship (CTRC), with a return date for acceptances, including first deposit, by 15 October. If 18 people (accepted in order of placing in the CTRC) from this 35 accept, the team is then filled.
2. **Applications and Nominations from Individuals** may be considered by the Commandant from individuals whether or not they compete in that year's CFRC or if they finish out of the top 35 of the CTRC. All such applications must be sent to the DCRA for the attention of the Commandant not later than 30 September following the CFRC. Such individuals may be:
 1. Members of the Canadian National Team Training Group;
 2. Nominated by the individual's Provincial Rifle Association residence; of shooters who have not competed at the CFRC or who finish outside the top 35 of the CTRC
 3. Any other individuals wishing to be considered as a member of the Team.
 4. All applicants and nominees must agree in writing that they will join the Team if selected.
 5. Any nomination/application for any individual who has not shot the CFRC during the previous five years should contain a brief summary of recent shooting history, e.g., performance in PRA events, participation in goodwill teams, etc.
 6. Once the replies from the initial invitees (i.e. from the top 35 in the Canadian Target Rifle Championship) have been

received, the Commandant has a free hand and may take whatever steps that he/she may deem to be appropriate to fill out the team from any other applications or nominations.

3. The normal number of TR shooting members of the Bisley Team is 18. Team Officers and Coaches, who have been elected or appointed to such positions, may, provided that they qualify under the above criteria, be additional shooting members of the Bisley Team. In a year when the overall team size is increased (e.g. for the Palma Match), all additional members of the team may be regarded as shooting members of the Bisley Team, provided they too qualify under the above criteria. This means that, in any given year, the number of shooting members may be more than 18, but all shooting members must be selected and qualify under the above criteria.
4. **F Class shooters.** The DCRA Executive Committee has approved that F Class shooters may be made members of the annual Canadian Team to Bisley. Ideally, since the F Class International Match at the Imperial Meeting is for four shooters, there should be at least four F Class shooters. However, if there were fewer than this, they would compete as individuals in the F Class matches. The F Class shooters will be full members of the Bisley Team, pay the same assessment and have all the same responsibilities and privileges. They will take their share in Team duties, and while not normally being able to shoot in the TR team events, they could do any other sort of duty, such as coaching, plotting, and support. Currently, the Bisley F Class International Match is on at the same time as the Kolapore, but there may be a small number of TR shooters available to assist the F Class Team in that match.
 1. **Primary selection from the F Class Canadian Championship (FCCC) at the CFRC:** The number of shooters to be approached immediately after the CFRC will be the top 6. If at least 4 people (accepted in order of placing in the FCCC) from this 6 accept, the team is then filled. Letters would be sent out immediately after the CRFC, with a return date for acceptances, including first deposit, by 15 October.
 2. **Applications from individuals who have applied for membership in the Canadian Teams for the next F Class World Championship (FCWC):** By notices in the Marksman (see below) and on the DCRA web site, and by the encouragement of the DCRA-appointed Captain of the FCWC Teams, such individuals would be invited to apply for the team whether or not they compete in that year's CFRC or if they finish out of the top 6 of the FCCC. Such applications must be sent to the DCRA for the attention of the Commandant not later than 30 September following the CFRC.

3. Nominations from Provincial Rifle Associations of shooters who have not competed at the CFRC or who finish outside the top 6 of the FCCC: Such nominations, which must include the agreement of the individual to join the Team if selected, must be sent to the DCRA for the attention of the Commandant not later than 30 September following the CFRC.
 4. Applications from any other individuals wishing to be considered as a member of the Team: Such nominations, which must include the agreement of the individual to join the Team if selected, must be sent to the DCRA for the attention of the Commandant not later than 30 September following the CFRC.
 5. Any nomination/application for any individual who has not shot the CFRC during the previous five years should contain a brief summary of recent shooting history, e.g., performance in PRA events, participation in goodwill teams, etc.
 6. Once the replies from the initial invitees (i.e. from the top 6 in the FCCC) have been received, the Commandant, with advice from the FCWC Captain and others, may take whatever steps as may be appropriate to fill out the team from other applications or nominations.
 7. Initially, applications from F(Open) and F(F/TR) shooters will be treated equally. However, in the future, some split of these F Classes may be used in the selection process.
5. Every member of the team must:
1. be either –
 1. a Canadian citizen (whether or not resident in Canada at the time of qualification), or
 2. a landed immigrant who has been resident in Canada for at least one year prior to the first Sunday of the meeting at which he/she qualifies for the team.
 2. not have shot for or been a member of another country's official rifle team within the 30 months preceding the date of the departure of the team to Bisley.
6. Members selected and accepting places on the team must travel under arrangements made by the DCRA and must agree to make a full commitment to the team. Those unable to accept a place on the team due to other commitments, or for any reason, cannot subsequently claim a place or be added to the team. There shall be no addition to the team after it has left Canada except in cases of dire emergency when specific permission may be given to the Commandant by the Executive Vice-President of the DCRA. In making up the team, the Executive Committee reserves, on behalf of the Association, the right to pass over any of the prospective members and to cancel, amend, alter or add to the rules under

which previous teams have been sent to Bisley.

7. It is to be understood that the sending of the team to England in any year depends upon the policy of the National Rifle Association of Great Britain and that of the DCRA.

The Royal Canadian Army Cadet National Shooting Team to Bisley

The Royal Canadian Army Cadet National Shooting Team to Bisley is selected from the graduates of the Army Cadet Leader Instructor Marksman Course conducted at the Army Cadet National Training Centre Connaught. The DCRA TR matches form part of the selection criteria.

Those cadets selected train during the off season to compete at the ISCRM, NRA and School matches at Bisley the following year.

INTERPROVINCIAL TEAM MATCHES

The Counties of Great Britain, States of Australia or the USA and comparable areas of other countries are **not** permitted to enter Interprovincial Matches. However, providing space is available, they may be allowed to "shoot alongside" in shoulder-to-shoulder events (i.e., for no official awards) subject to payment of the appropriate entry fee. If such a team makes a score that would have won the match, DCRA souvenirs will be awarded to the team members (12 each for teams firing alongside the Provincial and London Merchants).

The Provincial (#668)

(Second Thursday – shoulder to shoulder)

Open to TR teams of a Captain, coach, eight shooting members and two spares, all members of an official Provincial Team, or a group of such Teams approved by the DCRA Executive

<u>Rounds:</u>	15
<u>Targets:</u>	2 per team
<u>Time Limit:</u>	85 minutes

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by team members (including spares).

Each team must supply two register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The British Rifle Team Challenge Trophy**, presented to the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association by members of the British Rifle Team (Palma Trophy Match) in grateful recognition of much hospitable kindness received during their visit to Ottawa, September 1902, and **12 DCRA Badges to the winning team.**

The London Merchants (#666)

(Second Thursday – shoulder to shoulder)

Open to TR teams of a Captain, Coach, eight shooting members and two spares, all members of an official Provincial team, or group of such Teams approved by the DCRA Executive.

Distance: 900m
Rounds: 15
Targets: 2 per team
Time: 91 minutes

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by team members (including spares).

Each team must supply two register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The London Merchants Challenge Cup** donated by the Merchants of London in 1871 and **12 DCRA Badges** to the winning team.

CONCURRENT INTERPROVINCIAL TEAM MATCHES

The All-Comers Aggregate (Team) (#661)

(Provincial Teams Short Range Championship concurrent with the All-Comers Aggregate)

Open to TR teams of six members of an official Provincial Team (or group of such Teams approved by the DCRA Executive). Any number of teams from a province or approved group of provinces may enter.

Prizes: 6 Silver Medals to the winning team
6 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team if 8 or more teams enter

The Carling Breweries (#662)

(concurrent with the President's)

Open to TR teams of six members of an official Provincial Team (or group of such Teams approved by the DCRA Executive), of whom at least TWO must be Sharpshooters or Greenshots. Any number of teams from a province or approved group of provinces may enter.

Prizes: **The Carling Breweries Challenge Trophy** presented by Carling Breweries Ltd., and **6 Silver Medals.**
6 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team if 8 or more teams enter

The Coates (#663)

(Provincial Teams Long Range Championship, concurrent with the Gzowski Aggregate)

Open to TR teams of six members of an official Provincial Team or group of such Teams approved by the DCRA Executive. Any number of teams from a province or approved group of provinces may enter.

Prizes: **The Coates Cup** presented by Messrs. Coates Son & Company, Bankers of London, England, and **6 Silver Medals** to the winning team.
6 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team if 8 or more teams enter

The Jubilee (#664)

(concurrent with the Letson)

Open to TR teams of six previously named members from an official Provincial Team or group of such teams approved by the DCRA Executive, of whom at least TWO must be Sharpshooters or Greenshots. Any number of teams from a province or approved group of provinces may enter.

Prizes: **The Jubilee Cup**, a trophy offered in 1909 by the National Rifle Association of Great Britain in its competitions of that year, in commemoration of its fiftieth anniversary; and won outright by the Canadian Rifle Team, by making the highest aggregate score in the "Mackinnon" and "Kolapore" matches, and **6 Silver Medals** to the winning team.
6 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team if 8 or more teams enter

The Ladies' Pairs (#665)

(concurrent with the President's)

Open to TR teams of two ladies from one Province. The ladies need not be members of the Province's Official Team. A Province may enter more than one team in this match. Provincial groups are not eligible to enter this match.

Prizes: 2 Silver Medals to the winning team.
2 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team if 8 or more teams enter

The Macdonald Stewart Aggregate (Team) (#667)

(Provincial Teams Grand Aggregate Championship - concurrent with the Grand Aggregate)

Open to TR teams of EIGHT members of an official Provincial Team, or group of such Teams approved by the DCRA Executive. Any number of teams from a province or approved group of provinces may enter.

Prizes: **The Macdonald Brier Challenge Shield**, a Challenge Shield presented by W.C. Macdonald Regd Corp of Montreal, P.Q. in 1920 and **8 DCRA Badges** to the winning team.

8 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team if 8 or more teams enter

The Steinhardt (#669)

(concurrent with the Macdougall)

Open to TR teams of six, including at least three Greenshots, from one Province. Members of the team need not be on their Province's Official Team. A Province may enter more than one team in this match. Marksmanship Course Cadets in the Greenshot class are eligible for selection to their Province's Team(s). Provincial Groups are not eligible to enter this match. Entry must be made by the PRA, with consultation with the Officer Commanding the Cadet Marksmanship Course.

Prizes: **The Steinhardt Trophy**, presented in 1949 by the late Hon. Lawrence Steinhardt, AB, MA, LL.D, former United States Ambassador to Canada, for Provincial Tyro Teams at the Annual Prize Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association and **6 Silver Medals** to the winning team.
6 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team (if 8 or more teams enter)

The Veterans (Team) (#670)

(concurrent with the President's)

Open to teams of four TR shooters, from one Province, each of whom must be aged 60 or over on 1st July. Team members need not be on their Province's Official Team. A Province may enter more than one team in this match. Provincial groups are not eligible to enter this match.

Prizes: 4 Silver Medals to the winning team.
4 Bronze Medals to the 2nd place team if 8 or more teams enter

INTER-UNIT / UNIT RIFLE ASSOCIATION / CLUB / CADET TEAM MATCHES

Notes

1. See the conditions of particular matches for eligibility of different types of team.

2. Teams made up entirely of Cadets or Juniors from a single country may enter for separate prizes in the Gillespie, Gordon Highlanders, Mayor of Bagshot's Vase and Victoria Rifles of Canada concurrent team matches. Teams made up entirely of Canadian Cadets or Juniors may enter for separate prizes in the Aylmer Gard and Imperial Tobacco concurrent team matches. Such teams are not eligible for the trophies associated with these matches. For teams of Cadets or Juniors, the entry fee will be reduced to 50% of that paid by regular teams.

3. Non-Cadet teams from outside Canada, representing bona-fide clubs in their home country, may enter the Algonquin and Lansdowne Shoulder-to-Shoulder team matches, and the Gillespie, Gordon Highlanders, Mayor of Bagshot's Vase and Victoria Rifles of Canada concurrent team matches. Clubs from outside Canada must meet DCRA Rules (Chapter 1.01(9)) governing clubs. To avoid possible misunderstandings, a club from outside Canada wishing to enter any of these matches must submit its request in writing to the DCRA Match Director preferably in advance of the Canadian Championships and in any case not later than 1800 hours on the first Thursday of the Canadian Championships for all concurrent matches, and not later than 48 hours prior to the match for the Algonquin and Lansdowne. Teams that seek to enter after these deadlines may be allowed to shoot "alongside" but will not be eligible for any prizes.

4. Teams with one or more F class shooters, with all team members from a single country, may enter the Gillespie, Gordon Highlanders, Mayor of Bagshot's Vase and Victoria Rifles of Canada concurrent team matches. Silver medals will be awarded to the top F Class team in each match, provided that three or more F Class teams enter.

The Algonquin (#671)

(Second Friday)

Open to teams of four shooting members and a coach (who may also be one of the shooters) from a bona fide Canadian or Overseas Club or four past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association. Any number of teams may be entered from the same Club/Unit/Unit Rifle Association.

Club Teams with one or more F Class members may also shoot alongside, and will shoot on the standard "TR" targetry. If two or more such teams enter, 5 DCRA certificates will be awarded to the top scoring team in this category.

Teams of TR shooters from a single country may enter and shoot alongside, if space permits. Provided that at least three such teams enter, the DCRA will award 5 certificates to the first place team.

Distances: 800m and 900m
Rounds: 10 at each distance
Targets: 1 per team at each distance
Time: 64 minutes at each distance.

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by team members.

Each team must supply one register keeper to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The Sussex Home Guard Trophy**, presented in 1993 by the Sussex Home Guard (1944) Rifle Association to commemorate both the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the Association and the long and friendly relationship between the Association, Units of the Canadian Forces stationed in Sussex during the Second World War and the DCRA (the trophy was offered for competition for the first time in 1994), **and 5 SHGRA Bronze Medals** to the winning TR Club Team. If four or more non-Cadet teams enter, **5 DCRA Bronze Medals** will be awarded to the second place team. **The top scorer on any TR Team will be awarded a SHGRA Silver Medal.**
5 DCRA Certificates will be awarded to the top team composed entirely of Cadets or Juniors from a single country provided that four or more such teams enter. If eight or more such teams enter, **5 DCRA Certificates** will be awarded to the second place team.

The Aylmer Gard (#672)
(concurrent with the President's)

.Open to TR teams of four members of a bona fide Canadian Club or four past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association. Any number of teams may be entered from the same Club/Unit/Unit Rifle

Association. Only Canadian Clubs, Units or Unit Rifle Associations may compete in this match.

Prizes: **The Aylmer Gard Cup**, presented by the late Major General Lord Aylmer and the late Anson A. Gard, Esq., for Unit Competition, and **4 Silver Medals** to the winning team. If eight or more non-Cadet teams enter, **4 Bronze Medals** will be awarded to the second place team.

The Gillespie (#674)

(concurrent with the All Comers Aggregate)

Open to TR teams of four members of a bona fide Canadian or Overseas Club or four past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association. Any number of teams may be entered from the same Club/Unit/Unit Rifle Association.

Prizes: **The Gillespie Cup**, presented by the late T.G. Gillespie, Esq., formerly Secretary of the Canadian Club, London, England Challenge Cup and **4 Silver Medals** to the winning team. If eight or more non-Cadet teams enter, **4 Bronze Medals** will be awarded to the second place team.

The Gordon Highlanders (#675)

(concurrent with the Letson)

Open to TR teams of eight members of a bona fide Canadian or Overseas Club or eight past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association. Any number of teams may be entered from the same Club/Unit/Unit Rifle Association.

Prizes: **The Gordon Highlanders Trophy**, presented by the 1st Battalion Gordon Highlanders, as a memorial of service with Canadian Troops in the 19th Infantry Brigade and other units during the South African War, 1899-1902 and **8 Silver Medals** to the winning team. If eight or more non-Cadet teams enter, **8 Bronze Medals** will be awarded to the second place team.

“The following conditions accompany the Cup:

- 1. To be shot for annually by teams of not less than eight members. The Trophy is never to become the property of any individual Corps or Unit, but will be held by the Commanding Officer of the*

- Unit to which the winning team belongs.*
2. *The final details of the competition to be arranged annually by the Council of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.*

Pretoria, 6th February 1902 - J.W. Went, Captain"

The Imperial Tobacco (#676)

(Canadian Club Teams Championship - concurrent with the Grand Aggregate)

Open to TR teams of four members of a bona fide Canadian Club or four past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association. Any number of teams may be entered from the same Club/Unit/Unit Rifle Association. Only Canadian Clubs, Units or Unit Rifle Associations may compete in this match.

Prizes: **The Imperial Tobacco Trophy**, given by the Imperial Tobacco Company, and **4 Silver Medals** to the winning team. If eight or more non-Cadet teams enter, **4 Bronze Medals** will be awarded to the second place team.

The Lansdowne (#653)

(Second Saturday)

Open to teams of four members and a coach (who may also be one of the shooters) from a bona fide Canadian or Overseas Club or four past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association. Any number of teams may be entered from the same Club/Unit/Unit Rifle Association.

Club Teams with one or more F Class members may also shoot alongside, and will shoot on the standard "TR" targetry. If two or more such teams enter, 5 DCRA souvenirs will be awarded to the top scoring team in this category.

Teams of TR shooters from a single country may enter and shoot alongside, if space permits. Provided that at least three such teams enter, the DCRA will award 5 silver medals to the first place team.

Distance: 10 at 300y, 500y and 600y
& Rounds

Targets: 1 per team at each distance

Time: One hour at each distance

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by team members.
Each team must supply one register keeper to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The Lansdowne Cup**, a challenge cup presented by the Marquis of Lansdowne, KG, formerly Governor General of Canada, and **5 DCRA Certificates** to the winning TR team. If four or more teams enter, **5 DCRA Certificates** will be awarded to the second place team.
5 DCRA Certificates will be awarded to the top team composed entirely of Cadets or Juniors from a single country provided that four or more such teams enter. If eight or more such teams enter, **5 DCRA Certificates** will be awarded to the second place team.

The Mayor of Bagshot's Vase (#691)

Open to any number of TR teams of four from any bona fide Club in Canada or elsewhere, or past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association, or from the Athelings, or from the RCAC National Shooting Team to Bisley or from the Connaught Cadet Course (CLIM) or the ACF.

The team score will be the aggregate of the Alexander of Tunis (900m), the President's (500y only), the Gibson (300m and 600y only), and the NormanBeckett (800m only).

Prizes: 1st place team - **The Mayor of Bagshot Trophy**, presented in 1993 by Mr. Simon Pattinson, Commandant of the Athelings, for annual competition at the DCRA Matches. Part of the original trophy was lost and was replaced in 2001 by two silver bowls. The bowls were presented in 1925 by the NRA(GB) to Colonel D.R. Street, Commandant of the Canadian Bisley Team, which won both the Kolapore and the Mackinnon in that year. The bowls were subsequently obtained by Major J.W. Houlden and were donated to the DCRA after his death in 1994 in his memory by his granddaughter, Ms. Jill Buffie, and **4 Silver Medals** to the winning team. If eight or more non-Cadet teams enter, **4 Bronze Medals** will be awarded to the second place team.

The Victoria Rifles of Canada (#679)

(concurrent with the Gzowski Aggregate)

Open to TR teams of four members of a bona fide Canadian or Overseas

Club or four past or present members of a Canadian Unit or Unit Rifle Association. Any number of teams may be entered from the same Club/Unit/Unit Rifle Association.

Prizes: **The Victoria Rifles Cup**, a Challenge Cup presented by the Victoria Rifles of Canada and **4 Silver Medals** to the winning team. If eight or more non-Cadet teams enter, **4 Bronze Medals** will be awarded to the second place team.

CADET TEAM MATCHES

The Buell

(Concurrent with the NCFC Grand Aggregate)

A Challenge Trophy, for annual competition between first year cadets of the Royal Canadian Army Cadets attending the Army Cadet Leader Marksmanship Course at Connaught.

Open to teams of 8 shooters selected from the Army Cadet Leader Marksman Course representing the five Regional Army Cadet Summer Training Centres. Any number of teams from a Region may be entered.

Prizes: **The Buell Trophy**, presented to the DCRA by the Cadet Services of Canada Association in memory of the late Colonel Donald Bowie Buell, DSO, CD, and **8 Silver Medals**. **If eight or more teams enter, the second team will be awarded 8 Bronze Medals.**

The CANLOAN International Cadet Teams Match

(First Thursday)

Open to one team of Canadian Cadets taking part in the ACLI Marksman Course and one team of Army Cadet Force Cadets that participated in training during the year of the competition. Teams will consist of 16 Cadets (Captain, 12 shooters and 3 coaches/spares).

Rifles: Both teams will use the Canadian Cadet Largebore Target Rifle (C12). Ammunition as issued by DND must be used.

Distance: 500y and 600y

Rounds: 7 at each distance

Time Limit: 45 minutes at each distance

Targets: 3 per team at each distance

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by members of the team.

Each team must supply three register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The CANLOAN Trophy**, presented to the DCRA by the Government of Great Britain in honour of the Canadian Army Officers who served with British Army units during

World War II. These officers were loaned to Britain by the Canadian Army because of a shortage of trained officers in the British Army. The Canadians served with distinction and many were cited for acts of bravery and dedication to duty, and **16 Silver Medals** to the winning team.

The Michael Faraday Imperial Cadet Match (#685) (Second Thursday)

(Provided teams representing the Imperial Cadets and the Canadian Cadets enter the competition)

Open to teams of sixteen cadet members, (a Captain, 12 shooting members and 3 spares) from the Royal Canadian Army Cadets, the Athelings and any other official Commonwealth Country cadet team taking part in the DCRA Target Rifle Competitions. Only one team from each country may take part.

Distances: 300y, 500y and 600y

Rounds: 7 at each distance

Time Limit: 45 minutes at each distance

Targets: 3 per team at each distance

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by members of the team. Each team must supply three register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The Hanson Trophy**, presented to the DCRA by the late Surgeon Captain R.J.E. Hanson, OBE, PD, MA (Cantab.) of Fowey, Cornwall, England, in honour of Michael Faraday (1794-1867) and in recognition of the friendly relations between the Home Cadet Contingents and the Cadet Corps of Canada, and **16 DCRA Badges** to the winning team.

The DCRA will award 16 commemorative badges to the members of the Canadian Team in the Michael Faraday.

The Rex Goddard (First Thursday)

A Challenge Trophy for annual competition between the Canadian Bisley Cadets returning from the UK, and the official visiting UK Cadet contingent. The match is fired in two stages, the first at Bisley in July and

the second at Connaught in August.

Open to teams of sixteen (a Captain, 12 shooting members and 3 coaches/spares): one representing the current year's RCAC Bisley Team and the other the Athelings.

Stage 2

Rifles: Both teams will use the Canadian Cadet Largebore Target Rifle (C12). Ammunition as issued by DND must be used.

Distance: 500y and 600y

Rounds: 7 at each distance

Time Limit: 45 minutes at each distance

Targets: 3 per team at each distance

Coaching and spotting are allowed only by members of the team.

Each team must supply three register keepers to the Range Officer.

Prizes: **The Rex Goddard Trophy**, presented to the DCRA in 1987 by LCol A.J. Cafik, Commandant of the RCAC Bisley Teams in 1985-88, in honour of the services given overseas by Lt.Col. Rex Goddard of the Council for Cadet Rifle Shooting (CCRS), for all the work he and his dedicated staff have done for the Royal Canadian Army Cadet Bisley Teams visiting the United Kingdom each year. The Challenge Trophy is awarded to the team with the highest aggregate score in Stages 1 and 2

16 Silver Medals to the team with the highest score in Stage 2.

The United Empire (#687)

(concurrent with the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate)

Medals provided from a donation from the Sir Guy Carleton (Ottawa) Branch of the United Empire Loyalists in commemoration of the Bicentennial of Ontario in 1984.

Open to teams of two formed by pairing one member of the Athelings, whose name shall be drawn randomly from the list of the current year's team, and one member of the current year's RCAC National Shooting Team to Bisley, taken in order from the previous year's Cadet Bisley

Aggregate. The draw will be conducted by the DCRA. The names of the pairs will be posted by the DCRA by 1300 hours First Saturday. Scores will be posted each evening.

Entry Fee: Free

Prizes: 1st place - **The United Empire Trophy**, presented in 1913 by Lieutenant Colonel W. Hamilton Merrit of St. Catherines, in memory of the United Empire Loyalists who fell in the War of 1812-1814, and **2 Gold Medals**
2nd place - 2 Silver Medals
3rd place - 2 Bronze Medals

MISCELLANEOUS TEAM MATCHES

The Families (#688)

(concurrent with the President's)

Open to teams of two members from a family. A team must be husband and wife, parent and child, parent and grandchild, or brothers and/or sisters. Entries will be accepted from teams of TR shooters and from teams of F Class shooters.

Prizes: 2 Silver Medals to the winning TR team (if three or more TR teams enter).

If six or more TR teams enter, 2 DCRA Bronze Medals will be awarded to the second place TR team.

2 Silver Medals to the winning F Class team (if three or more F Class teams enter).

If six or more F Class teams enter, 2 DCRA Bronze Medals will be awarded to the second place F Class team.

The Champion Pairs (#689)

(concurrent with the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate)

Open to pairs of TR shooters and pairs of F Class shooters. Team members need not be from the same Country, Province or Association, etc.

The Senior – Under 25 Pairs (#690)

(concurrent with the All Comers Aggregate)

Each Under 25 shooter (as of 1st July) entered in a TR Class in the Grand Aggregate will be paired with an older shooter in a TR Class by a random draw. The draw will be conducted by the DCRA Office. The names of overseas competitors will be included in the draw. The list of pairs will be posted by 1300 hours on First Saturday. The members of the pair are strongly encouraged to meet with each other, and to assist and support each other during the week's shooting. Scores will be posted each evening.

Entry Fee: Free

Prizes: Plaques for 1st 2nd and 3rd place

The TR/F Class Pairs (#719)

A Challenge Trophy, presented in 2006 by Matthew Charlton and David Rumbold, formerly of the Royal Grammar School, Guildford, U.K.

Open to teams consisting of one TR shooter and one F Class shooter.

Concurrent with the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate.

Prizes: The Old Guildfordians Trophy and two DCRA Gold Medals to the winning pair
2 DCRA Silver Medals to the 2nd place pair, provided there are at least 5 pairs entered.
2 DCRA Bronze Medals to the 3rd place pair, provided there are at least 10 pairs entered.

ANNEX A

Tie Shoots

Unless otherwise stated in the conditions, a tie for first place in a match or aggregate will be decided by a shoot off, in accordance with DCRA Rules. The times and locations of tie shoots will be posted on the Notice Board. Eligible competitors are responsible for ensuring that they are present for their tie shoot.

Prizes

The results of each event will be recognized by one or more of the following:

- Challenge trophies and special souvenir awards;

- Medallion awards;

- Cash Prizes;

- Team awards.

Prize lists may be lengthened or curtailed by the Executive Committee in accordance with the number of entries. To be eligible for a prize in any match or aggregate, a competitor must return a match ticket for each range that makes up the match or aggregate. Otherwise the competitor will not be placed in that match or aggregate. The sole exceptions are the Aggregate for the 21st Century, the Canadian Target Rifle Championship, the Canadian F Class Championship, and the Cadet Bisley Aggregate (q.v.), where the scores of all eligible competitors will be shown whether or not they fire each range.

Challenge Trophies and Special Souvenir Awards

Under the conditions governing certain competitions, Challenge Trophies and/or other Special Prizes or Souvenirs may be awarded. (See each event for any such conditions).

Medallion Awards

A DCRA Medallion with Ribbon and Bar will be awarded to competitors who are so designated in the prize lists of the following competitions and aggregates:

Medallions Colours and Bars

Except where specified, first and second place winners will be awarded a "Gold" or "Silver" Medallion respectively. Others who are so designated in the Prize List will receive a "Bronze" Medallion. All medallion winners will also receive a bar with the name of the event and a bar with the year of competition. In the case of First and Second place winners the bars will be "Gold" and "Silver" respectively: other bars will be "Bronze".

However, in individual matches and aggregates where three or more competitors tie, the winner of the tie shoot will be awarded a gold medallion, and all other competitors in the tie shoot will be deemed to be equal second and each will receive a silver medallion.

In such cases the number of OPEN bronze medallions will be reduced appropriately.

In all other cases, the winners of silver and bronze medallions will be determined by Rule 24.03. If tie breaking rules cannot determine the winner, additional medallions will be awarded as necessary.

Multiple Winners

All "Gold" Medallions with event bars will be presented at the Prize Giving. When any competitor qualifies for more than one "Gold", "Silver" or "Bronze" medallion, only the appropriate name bar will be awarded for the second and subsequent events. (i.e. a competitor cannot receive more than one "Gold" one "Silver" and one "Bronze" medallion and year bar, but can receive any number of event bars.)

Distribution

Those eligible for Medallion awards will be designated in the prize lists. Silver and bronze awards will be mailed after the meeting. The % of entry refers to those competitors who return a match ticket for each range of the match or aggregate.

Except for the specific competitions and aggregates noted below, TR medallions will be awarded as follows:

Open: First - Gold
 Second - Silver
 plus a number of bronze medallions equal to 10% of the entry in the Master Class.

Reserved: A number of Bronze medallions,

 for those not in the Master Class, equal to 10% of the entry in the Expert class;

for those not in the Master or Expert Class, equal to 10% of the entry in the Sharpshooter Class;

for those not in the Master, Expert or Sharpshooter Classes, equal to 10% of the entry in the Greenshot Class.

For the All-Comers and Gzowski Aggregates, medallions will be awarded as above except that the percentage of entries in each class will be 15%.

For the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate, medallions will be awarded as above except that the percentage of entries in each class will be 20%.

For the Patron's Match, one gold, one silver, and five bronze medallions will be awarded to TR shooters irrespective of class.

For the Canadian Target Rifle Championship, one gold, one silver, and 16 bronze medallions will be awarded irrespective of class.

For the Cadet Bisley Aggregate, one gold, one silver, and 16 bronze medallions will be awarded irrespective of class. The number of bronze medallions may be adjusted to match the total number of those qualifying for the RCAC Bisley Team.

For the Cadet/Junior Open Short Range Aggregate and the Canadian Cadet TR Championship, one gold, one silver and a number of bronze medallions will be awarded as on the above Reserved List, with the number of medallions being based on 15% of the class entry.

In each of the F/Open and F/Farquharson classes, unless otherwise stated, awards are open to all competitors in that F Class. Medallions will be awarded for each of the competitions and aggregates listed for TR above, with distribution as follows:

if the total entry in an F Class is three or more, but less than eight - one gold medallion;

if the total entry in an F Class is eight or more, but less than fifteen - one gold and one silver medallion;

if the total entry in an F Class is fifteen or more - one gold, one silver and a number of bronze medallions equal to 10% of the entry in the F-Open Class (15% in the All-Comers and Gzowski Aggregates and 20% in the Macdonald Stewart Grand Aggregate).

For the Patron's Match, the top two F/Open shooters will receive gold and silver medallions respectively. The top two F/Farquharson shooters will receive gold and silver medallions respectively

Cash Prizes

Cash prizes are awarded in certain events as shown in their conditions.

Team Awards

In each team match, an individual souvenir will be awarded to each member of the winning team. The numbers of such souvenirs are determined by the team strength, as outlined in the conditions of the match.

HPS Awards

The DCRA will present a special HPS award to any competitor who scores a possible (HPS) in any 10 or 15 round shoot in an individual match during the Canadian Fullbore Rifle Championships. Competitors who score more than one HPS in these shoots may purchase extra awards (one for each possible) from the DCRA at a cost to be posted during the Championships. For the "F" and "TR" Classes, the HPS is based on gun-score, not including V-bulls.

Please note that a 7-round shoot does not qualify by itself for an HPS award, but that a score of 105 in the Letson does.
